From there apparently neither made mistakes. **Dmitri Golovanov** also ran a good race to finish 3rd in 0:46:53. **Nadine Cybulski** was the top female on the course, covering the 26 checkpoints (2 maps) in 1:03:02.

The #2 course, with 15 controls over its 4.0 km, was actually the first half of the *Long* course. **Francis Falardeau** had been planning to do the Long but a leg injury caused him to settle for the 4 k *Middle*, which he led with a fast 0:24:12. **Anna Fichman** placed 2nd (0:44:04) and Patrick Fernet was 3rd (0:53:06).

There were only 2 participants on the #1 3.2 km *Short* course: 12-year old **Leo Denotkine** completed it in 0:58:33 and **Lina Shoumarova**, participating in her first event with us, finished the 17 controls in 2:03:00. Congratulations to both.
